Keep your plants free of bugs and water very carefully as botrytis can occur and a frost straight after watering will destroy your plant. With watering, if in doubt – don't water!

Generally just keep an eye on them, as we want every plant you have in flower at our show! ED

CULTURE QUESTIONS

Q. What do you feed calanthes on?

A. Hydroponic food *Budzilla* available from Switched on Gardener. Use at CF6.

Q. How many people with open shade houses had problems with the recent heavy frosts and what can we do to cope with frost?

A. Wrap shade house in light plastic before the first winter frost.

Place frost cloth over plants when frost is expected.

Use heat cables under our plants.

Reduce watering and try to ensure plants are dry on frosty nights.

Burn a wax candle-the extra CO₂ will also promote growth, but be careful and safe.

Back windows of cars have heater cables-buy one from a car wrecker and set it up.

Keep a fan going-air movement stops the frost settling.

Oil filled heaters keep the chill off the air and are not too expensive to run.

GUEST SPEAKER - Rodney Draper

Stenoglottis

Distribution and natural habitat:

Stenoglottis are distributed widely in eastern Southern Africa from the coast to 1800m. Most grow at altitude where they get a lot of mist in winter. They grow naturally as terrestrials amongst the forest vegetation. Their fleshy tuberous roots which are hairy allows the plant to attach itself to rocks, earth banks and moss covered tree trunks.

There are 6 species found in South Africa, the most common 3 of which in NZ are Sngl. *longifolia*, *fimbriata* and *woodii*.

Cultivation: In winter temperatures range from 6-22° C and in summer as high as 34° C. Humidity should range from 50% - 80% in summer.

Stenoglottis are from a summer rainfall area with an active growth season from spring to autumn and a short dormant period in autumn. After April leaves start to yellow and die back. Remove dead leaves and prune flower stems. Withold water to allow medium to dry, but it is vital that they do not dehydrate completely. To prevent this, drench the pot every 2-3 weeks and allow to dry. When new rosettes of leaves emerge in late winter or early spring, water lightly until the weather warms.

Repotting: Leave for at least 2 years before repotting into larger pots or replacing old potting mix. Repot during the dormant stage-May to July. Stenoglottis require a free draining medium, 50% river sand, 40% leaf mulch and 10% vermiculite.

Remove the root ball from the pot, the dead leaves and most of the old potting medium. Divide the root ball if required. Place a layer of coarse stone chips in the bottom of the pot for drainage. Fill pot to ³/₄ with fresh potting medium and arrange tuberous roots to allow the growing point to be planted below the potting medium surface. Cover. Shallow pots and pans are ideal.

Pests: There are few insect problems but watch out for aphids and mealy bug, and treat.

Medicinal and cultural uses: Roots are used by Africans in the preparation of an enema for flatulence relief.

Rodney did not grow orchids until he arrived in NZ, so it was natural that he should show an interest in the orchids of his homeland.

Stenoglottis grow not far from where Rodney lived, but he has never seen them in their natural habitat. Maybe on his next trip home he will seek them out! Thank you Rodney for a fantastic presentation with accompanying slides.
