<u>GUEST SPEAKER</u> <u>March Meeting</u>

> George Fuller MBE

George was born and raised in Te Atatu into a horticulturally minded family. Luck would have it that his neighbour was Fred Powell, a renowned orchid grower who fostered George's interest in orchids and encouraged him to pursue a career in horticulture which led him to Sander's Nurseries in England and Belgium and a time at Kew Gardens, London. George spent 17 years overseas and finally arrived home in NZ along with his wife Doris and family. A chance offer of a job in New Plymouth secured him the position of curator at Pukekura Park for the next 38 years until retirement in 1990.

George spoke to us on his favourite topic-plant physiology, in the hope that we would better understand how our plants function and enable us to replicate their natural requirements and assist them to grow better in captivity in our orchid houses.

The orchidaceae family is one of the greatest plant families with over 30,000 members. Orchids are recognised on the whole by having 6 parts to each flower with the labellum modified for pollination by a particular pollinator. Orchids are notorious for their diversity of form. ie: Roots of orchids are distinctive by their velamen, a specially adapted covering of the root designed to absorb moisture from the air and in some cases, sunlight (eg Vanda). Root activity is crucial to orchid growing allowing the movement of water and nutrients by a process known as osmosis. As water evaporates from the plant more water and food is drawn up via the roots as long as the strength of the solution at root level is weaker than the level in the plant. (One of the reasons we should not put on strong liquid fertilizer as it reverses the process).

Air, light and water along with nutrition and a suitable temperature all interact and each plant has a different balance of these needs. The plants communicate these requirements to you, but you need to be able to interpret what your plant is telling you! Air moves, it is never still and temperature changes alter air movement. Fans will make air move but will also increase evaporation from the leaf. This action takes water vapour only but salts are left behind to allow osmosis to occur at the roots. If evaporation is rapid, the water moving through the plant brings with it food, therefore feeding your plant as well. Oxygen is also required for cell division to take place ie: your plant is 'growing'.

Plants need a source of energy (the sun) and oxygen present even at root level which is why orchids need a free draining mix to allow the velamen to function properly and why some do better on slab culture.

Where there is light there is radiant energy which we can feel but cannot grasp, yet it is vital to existence. Only 3-4% of the bulk of a plant is 'dry matter'. The leaves of orchids are the factory of the plant, and it is chlorophyl or the green part which performs the miracles. They take in air, including carbon dioxide and combine radiant energy from the sun and water from the roots to make starch - sugar, in the process oxygen is given off, this is photosynthesis. Sugars are translocated in soluble form, some are used for growth or transferred to starch and stored in a solid form in bulbs. Some highly concentrated sugar solution returns to the roots for cell division there.

Flower production is reliant on sufficient carbohydrate manufacture. If leaves are dark the plant tells you it needs more sunlight - it is deprived of radiant energy, lighter leaves indicate lots of sun and the plant is attempting to reflect light back.

Water is the great carrier in a plants' system and is evident by the turgidity of the plant, insufficient water and the leaves wilt. Remember nutrients go up the plant but carbohydrates come down and the health of your plant depends on both.

Thank you George for your relaxed and informal presentation, it allowed us all to understand how our plants function, in a basic manner and I am sure they will benefit greatly from this knowledge, all we need to do is speak their language.

It was lovely to have several members of George's extended family at our meeting and visitors from other clubs present as well. George is now 80 years young and is finding speaking engagements more difficult, so this was possibly his final effort and fit-tingly in the area where he started his career.

George received his MBE for services to orchids and the community and he also received a Gold Medal at the World Orchid Conference in 1990. It was an honour for us to be able to view these treasures.
