Cymbidiums

Ross Crabb told us his growing secrets. His plants are housed in a shade house with a plastic floor, he does not add extra protection around the sides during winter. Ross grows his plants in No 3 bark. He feeds with *Bio Plus* and uses slow release fertiliser on plants he has not recently repotted. Ross likes to grow seedlings as there is always an element of surprise when flowering them. (This was the first time Ross has done a 'talk' at the club and it was great to hear his way of growing).

Melvin Alexander also dave us information on his growing conditions and hints on culture. His plants are housed in in his carport raised off the floor on a bench. The bench faces east. The sides are covered in shade cloth and the south end has plastic covering during the winter for a bit of protection from the cold. Melvin repots every 2 years and adds Osmocote to his plants in spring and also uses Bio Plus fertiliser. He ensures all his pots have free drainage. (Another first 'talk' and once again good to hear how other people grow).

Dendrobiums

Glenys MacRae had really done her homework for her talk. She had 1 1/2 pages of typed notes which we have edited to fit the newsletter. Her plants grow on her patio and in summer she makes her rotary clothes line into a shadehouse. (A novel idea but we didn't hear what she does with her laundry!) The genus Dendrobium has about 1400 species and can be found in many parts of the world. They flower from spring to early summer and some have a rest One of the easiest groups of dendrobiums to grow are the Australian natives and they are great plants for beginners. They like to grow in a free draining medium. No2 bark for small plants, No3 for bigger plants. They do not like 'wet feet' but they do like plenty of light, fresh air and humidity.

They can be grown successfully in shallow pots and rafted onto slabs.

Repot in October after flowering. The pot should be just big enough to contain the root system. Some people like to leave their plant in the same pot until the pot is about to split.

Watering: Generally a thorough watering is more effective than frequent light watering. It is preferable to water in the morning so that leaves are dry by nightfall. Increase watering in summer and cut back in cooler months.

Feeding: A variety of fertilisers can be used particularly during the warmer months (spring to autumn). A good one to start on is *Bio Plus* at least once a week. This fertiliser can be used on other genera so is good if you have a small mixed collection.

Air movement: Very important for all orchids and is helpful in preventing fungal and bacterial diseases.

Dendrobiums produce aerial plants (keikei's) which can be potted up and grown into new plants.

Pests: Watch for scale and aphids.

<u>A non toxic spray can be used against these.</u>

2 tablespoons Surf washing powder. 1 tablespoon methylated spirits 1 tablespoon all seasons oil Mix into 4 litres of water for spraying. Don't spray on flowers as the oil will

mark them. Nobile type dendrobiums are an Indian species. They are easy to bloom and come in a multitude of colours. They produce elongated pseudobulbs known as canes, and the flowers are produced in two's and three's along the cane between the leaves. They flower in spring after winter resting.

Grow in cool to intermediate conditions. Good light is essential for flowering. Water well in summer but keep plants

The most common form grown is the 'crucifix' orchid which grows easily in the garden. Breeding today is changing their form to more compact plants with bigger heads of flowers. They belong to the same family as cattleya's so can be cross bred with them.

Potting medium is No2 bark (fine roots so fine bark), with addition of crushed shells and pumice.

Liquid feeding at every watering is advocated using a variety of fertilisers to ensure a coverage of trace elements and a calcium feed about once per month which helps prevent die back of leaf tips.

Pick the tip out of your small growing plants to encourage new growths for a compact plant.

<u>A message from Roy re granular</u> fertiliser.

There are two main types.

a. Glass coated prills which expand and contract with temperature changes but do not dissolve, eg **Osmocote**, which needs to be spread on top of the pot where it will heat up, expand, and release small amounts of fertiliser over a long period of time.

b. Granule types which dissolve rapidly when water is added. There is a risk of
